Past Times Summer Camp: Educational and Engaging

Sixteen children explored early Louisiana history during Past Times Camp at Destrehan Plantation on July 20 – 24, 2020. The week started with a study of Native American traditions and the daily lives of early settlers along the Mississippi River and concluded with the firing of a Civil War cannon.

Campers experienced 18th and 19th century life through hands-on activities such as making butter, weaving, oldtime games, vintage dancing, and candle dipping. Through interactive presentations provided by local experts, the campers learned about slavery, the Louisiana Purchase, the War of 1812, the Civil War, open-hearth cooking, historical clothing, Louisiana plants

This new pathway allows guests with mobility issues to safely move from the Plantation Store to the Manor House. For our second project, we completed 750 ft. of resurfacing on our main road leading to our parking lot located at the back of our property. Both completed projects will provide increased mobility, safety and security to guests for years to come.
